


Irresistible Offa

New Radnor



T The nearest toilets on this walk are those located in the local pubs. The Radnor Arms is the most central one for this walk

- P** New Radnor is a small enough village to allow for some retracing of footsteps and general meandering. However, you could park in the main street (Broad Street).
- 1** Walk uphill and turn right at the junction (signposted to Kinner-ton). Brookside Farm on the right dates from the 16th/17th century. Its timber frame was re-fronted in stone in the 19th century. A little further up the road, the old town walls are marked by a line of trees.
 - 2** Head back down the road and turn right up Mutton Dingle. You can see where the old town wall was on your right, before taking the footpath on your left to the site of the old castle where you can enjoy the views, see the old town walls and the grid pattern of streets. Continue down to the Church of St Mary. Built in the mid 19th century, it was probably founded 600 years previously. Beyond it lies a motte and bailey.
 - 3** Follow the tarmaced road down from the church into the vil-lage, past the war memorial then right, into Church Street. No 11 is from the 16th/17th century, and no 8 is 15th century, while nos 1 and 2, were formerly part of The Cross Inn, but altered and divided in the 19th century. All are Grade II listed. Further down Church Street, note the circular cross head built into a barn wall.
 - 4** Retrace your footsteps into the village. Turn right, down Recto-ry Lane and past Hall Lane. Bear left and into Broad Street, then turn right and continue to the large monument (8) erected in 1864 to the memory of George Cornwall Lewis MP.
 - 5** Turn left into Water Street and left back into Broad Street.
